



Bonjour de l'Ontario





This is the second quarterly update to our 2023 Outlook for cattle and hogs published in February. Over the last two weeks, we updated our Outlooks for dairy and major crops.

Prices for fed steers in Ontario and Alberta have continued to gain since our May outlook update. Our forecasts for each price category are also higher year-over-year (YoY) and significantly higher than their respective five-year averages. Prices for live hogs have similarly improved since May except for Manitoba feeder hogs and isoweans, bringing some relief to eastern producers. However, they've not yet returned to the levels we had initially forecasted in February.

Hog margins still facing pressure: Cattle sector is in a good spot


As good as cattle margins were in 2022, they will improve in 2023. Cow-calf operations will easily surpass the five-year average, while feedlot profitability should return to the black throughout 2023 after five hard years. Isowean margins continue to face pressure, especially in the East, as do eastern farrow-to-finishers. Western farrow-to-finish operations should expect positive returns, although they will fall short of the five-year average.

In February, we identified a shrinking North American herd, red meat demand, and escalating feed costs as three factors to monitor throughout 2023.

North American drought conditions adding to herd size woes

Our February outlook showed a year-over-year decline in the North American cattle herd as of January 1. As of July 1, the U.S. herd on feed is estimated at 13.1 million head (a 2% year-over-year decline) and the Alberta/Saskatchewan herd on feed at 910 thousand head (a 7.7% decline year-over-year but in line with the 5-year average). The 2.9% decline in the overall size of the North American beef herd as of July 1 is the biggest year-over-year drop in the last 30 years, as cows and heifers continue to show up in an increasing percentage of total cattle slaughter (Figure 1). The USDA estimates (see URL below Figure 1) that the U.S. herd will decline by 3.0%, and the Canadian herd will shrink by 2.2% year-over-year in 2023.

Figure 1: Another year-over-year dip in the North American cattle herd





Western soil moisture lacking

Soil moisture across the prairies is well below normal for July 24rd. While many Saskatchewan crops continue to look good, Manitoba and Alberta especially are seeing some challenging conditions with repercussions for Canada's livestock sectors.

Dry periods can accelerate slaughter as cow-calf producers balance lower their own feed supplies while minimizing purchased feed at elevated prices. In this situation, they're likelier to send more heifers to feedlots rather than retain them, which is what happened during the drought of 2021 (Figure 2). Cow slaughter also picked up during the period.

On the other hand, high prices in 2014-15 served as a signal to retain cattle to build a stronger herd, visible as a drop in cow and heifer slaughters between November 2014 and July 2016. But the extent of western dryness this year is keeping slaughter numbers strong, despite a small and shrinking North American cattle herd and price signals that might otherwise motivate heifer retention.

The reduced numbers have impacted beef production in both markets. Canadian beef production will fall 3.6%, and U.S. production will be cut by 4.0% YoY. Carcass weights are also lighter YoY across North America and lighter than they were in 2021. But with higher slaughters in the last two years, there are fewer cattle to keep meat processing plants running closer to capacity in 2023. It appears that younger cattle are being pulled from feedlots early to reduce underutilization.


Production declines needed to support hog sector as consumption wanes in North America

With the ongoing shuttering of five pork processing plants, Canadian pork production is forecasted to be down 2.9% YoY. Unsurprisingly, our pork exports are also forecasted to drop 8.0% YoY. On the other hand, hog exports are expected to increase 50% YoY, destined for U.S. processing which the USDA pegs at 1.4% higher YoY. Global pork production will stabilize this year at last year's levels, with a minor increase for China (1.1%) that will keep production at pre-African Swine Fever levels. Taken together, Canadian hog prices aren't likely to rebound without a contraction in U.S. production, and that's unlikely to happen in the near term. And this is occurring even as the North American industry grapples with California's Proposition 12, which implies that pig and pork sales in the state must come from animals housed in cages larger than the currently used gestation crates.

Global consumption will also flatten this year, with a 1.3% increase in China's consumption offsetting declines in Brazil, the E.U. and the U.K. Japan and South Korea will see no YoY changes. It remains very strong, though, at 8.1% higher than the previous five-year average (2018 – 2022).

The North American outlook isn't as rosy, though, as the U.S. is expected to see a 1.9% YoY decrease in pork consumption which will more than offset an expected 9.4% bump in Canada. Here at home, despite a favourable price differential, pork is facing an uphill battle (Figure 3).

FCC Economics' red meat demand indices show that consumers' preferences for beef are still strong.

Recent increases in pork consumption levels have resulted from favourable price swings at the retail level. Despite its low prices and the relatively higher prices of beef and chicken, pork demand is finding it hard to regain the vigour exhibited before the pandemic.

With feed costs, volatility is the word

As far as profitability is concerned, the good news is that current feed costs have not taken off from the heights of 2022 feed costs. But it's a bit of a guess as to where they'll end up. Recent volatility has produced downturns and price gains in response to the news. First, South America's record corn crops are alleviating some fears. Second, there's the uncertainty arising from the Black Sea region, where Ukrainian grains may not have a safe passage for export. Third, North American dryness and drought conditions produce more uncertainty




Figure 4: U.S. new crop corn sales to Canada (as of July 20)

Feedlots are more proactively sourcing feed grains compared to the last drought in the 2021-2022 crop year (Figure 4). That year, Canada imported 3.7 million tonnes (mt) of corn from the U.S. This year, feedlots are jumping on the expected drought-induced feed grain shortage much sooner. Canada has already purchased over 450,000 mt of corn for delivery at the start of the new crop year in September, with deliveries already showing up.

Bottom line

Perhaps the largest factor weighing on Canadian red meat sectors is the weather. Drought conditions in North America have led to feed costs creeping up again after trending down throughout most of 2023. With such good current prices, they're also keeping cattle slaughter rates higher than we'd expect. For their part, the hog s ector must contend with rising costs and lowered prices.





The 23 projects to be funded focus on three AgriScience program priorities: Climate Change and Environment, Economic Growth and Development, and Sector Resilience and Societal Challenges. Research activities include reducing methane emissions through feeding strategies, breeding forages that are more productive and profitable, and developing technologies for faster response to emerging diseases.

Quick Facts:

- The beef and cattle industry is one of the largest in Canadian agriculture, with 11 million cattle and calves on 72,275 farms and ranches on January 1, 2022.
- Canada is one of the largest exporters of livestock and red meat in the world, exporting approximately 50% of Canadian beef and cattle production each year.



- Videos must be sent to Paul Fee by the closing date. They can be sent via file sharing services (wetransfer.com works well), private message on Facebook or place on YouTube with a link emailed. The video size of a direct email will likely be too large, and will not work.
- 3. All entrants must be 2023 CBDA members in good standing by the entry deadline.
- 4. Entries must be Registered 75% (3/4) Blonde or above.
- 5. Registrations must be applied for and received at the CLRC by the entry deadline.
- 6. There is a limit of 3 entries per breeder per class.
- 7. Cow/Calves may be split for classes. Both are eligible for the Championship class should they advance.

The award will be presented annually at the CBDA "National" event Nominations will open on July 1st, and must be received by August 1st each year.

Nominations may be submitted by letter post or email.

The award year will run from August 1st to July 31st.

Nominator and nominee must be paid CBDA members in good standing for the years in question.

Members may not nominate themselves, family members or those that they share memberships/breeding programs with.

An individual or an entire farm operation may be nominated.





The Canadian commercial feed market (for example, pelleted rations for cattle, dairy, hog and poultry) grew over 20% in 2022, reaching a record \$11.5 billion in sales. Most of this growth was driven by increases in feed grain prices stemming from Russia's war against Ukraine. The livestock sector has faced numerous years of tight feed supplies and expensive feed grains. High feed costs have pressured profitability throughout the Canadian livestock industry, including feed mill operators, as volatile commodity prices negatively impacted their margins.

We are projecting the Canadian commercial feed market to grow 6.6% in 2023 to \$12.3 billion, driven by strong livestock receipts and feed grain prices that remain historically high. The Eastern Canadian commercial feed market is expected to have the largest growth at over 9% in 2023 to \$6.1 billion. Eastern Canadian growth is driven by its large dairy sector and an expanding poultry sector. In Western Canada, we are projecting a 4.0% increase in feed sales to \$5.7 billion, largely due to drought conditions and the need to purchase feed. In Atlantic Canada, we are projecting a 7.6% increase in feed sales but recent flooding in Nova Scotia could change that projection.

Drought conditions have once again led to rising feed costs

Feed grain prices did trend down through the first half of 2023. However, drought conditions in North America have once again led to rising feed costs. Drought conditions have resulted in stressed pastures and reduced hay crops. Provincial crop insurance agencies in Western Canada have moved quickly to allow producers to move poor crops into alternative uses (for example, grazing or baling), which provides some relief to the drought-stricken livestock sector. Corn imports have also risen as the feedlot sector braces for tighter feed supplies as we head into the fall calf-run and winter 2024 feeding. Some cowcalf and feedlot operations have worked with their local feed mills to utilize screening rations with supplements to maintain herds and make up for poor pasture conditions.

The fall calf run has already begun in regions facing extreme drought conditions that are forcing either an earlier weaning of calves or culling of cattle. Increased numbers of cows and heifers are heading to slaughter. A continued contraction of the North American cattle herd was expected as indicated in our top charts to monitor in 2023, but we now expect further contraction. Getting through the drought conditions will be key for these operations. The good news, if any during a drought, is sales are occurring at strong prices, providing cashflow for operations to re-build their herds once pasture conditions improve. However, rebuilding cattle herds following drought and culling is a multi-year initiative. The drought's impact on herd size will ultimately impact feed mill sales into 2024 and beyond. We are currently in a weather market, with volatile feed prices and a market that could now go in either direction depending on weather and its final impact on overall North American production.

North American hog sector expected to contract

In addition to high feed costs, profitability challenges in


the pork/hog sector are having impacts throughout the supply chain. The North American hog sector is going through an economic down cycle. Hog herd size is expected to decline as the number of sows bred and farrowings decline across North America. A decline in the hog herd means reduced feed demand in the short run and will weigh on the commercial feed market as farrowings are reduced and fewer hogs are finished in Canada. Hog production declines are expected to occur as the North American sector adapts to reduced pork demand. The current contraction in the hog sector is likely temporary as the hog sector expansion phase will once again return. The hog production contraction and expansion cycle is much shorter than beef at approximately four years.

Challenges in both the cattle and hog sectors will have far-reaching consequences for red meat production in North America and agribusiness input suppliers.

Expanding poultry sector an area of growing opportunity

Canadians love chicken and eggs. Per capita chicken meat consumption is up 16% since 2010 and eggs are up 32% (Figure 2). Canada's population recently hit 40 million people and is growing at a record pace. Canada's population has a direct impact on the feed supply business, particularly in Eastern Canada with its larger presence of supply managed sectors (for example, poultry and dairy). Along with having nearly half of the Canadian population, Eastern Canada's immigration levels are rising, which is good news for the Canadian poultry industry (and to a lesser extent the entire livestock industry) and, subsequently, the commercial feed industry.

Growth of oilseed crush disruptor to feed rations

The Canadian canola crush sector is currently undergoing expansion driven by increased emission reduction mandates (for example, clean fuel regulations) that are increasing biofuel demand. The crush sector is expected to add approximately 4.5 million tonnes of additional crush capacity by the end of 2024, and 2-plus

million additional tonnes in the years following. The additional capacity represents over 3.5 million tonnes of additional canola meal produced. The increased meal will either be exported or used domestically. The most likely scenario is increased use in feed formulizations and feed ingredient additives. In the longer term, how livestock is fed in North America will continue to evolve as the expanded soybean and canola crush sector disrupts the industry. It will structurally change what we feed livestock, especially if a surplus of meals become available and cheaper for the livestock sector.


Bottom line

Challenges in both the cattle and hog sectors will have far-reaching consequences for red meat production in North America and agribusinesses input suppliers. Feed mill profitability is expected to be volatile in the short term, but the future looks bright in the long term with additional supplies of feed options, including canola meal and canola screenings, and opportunities to integrate soymeal into feed rations. A growing Canadian population will continue to demand domestically produced meat.
