## Alberta Blonde Bulls on Test at Strathmore

The Alberta Blonde Association bull test is now complete at Cattleland Feedyards near Strathmore, Alberta. Five Blonde breeders contributed 19 bulls for the test.

All the bulls were penned together, however they have been separated on paper for indexing purposes. Convention dictates that only bulls within 90 days of age of each other should be indexed together. For this test the January/February born bulls have been indexed together, with the March/April/May bulls in a second group. There are Fullblood and Purebred bulls in the test, with a majority being polled. They were delivered in early November for a warm-up period to let them adjust to new surroundings, new feed and to help even out some of the environmental weight differences of the bulls before the test started. The official test started December 10, 2011 and concluded March 30, 2012. The bulls are weighed every 28 days during the test.

Carcass ultrasound and scrotal circumference results are available on our website. If you would like to have the results sent directly to you, please contact The Alberta Blonde Association (Reed Rigney). The bulls have headed for home, and are available for purchase by private treaty, so if you are interested in any of the bulls on test, contact the contributor, the Alberta Blonde Association or William Torres at Cattleland Feedyards. Last year they sold out early so don't wait too long.



#### Man/Sask Bull Test

The Manitoba Bull Test Station at Douglas, Manitoba is owned and operated by the Manitoba Beef Cattle Performance Association Inc. The test station is a non-profit organization that has been in operation for over 40 years. The goal is to develop bulls and heifers to meet the needs of the ever changing cattle industry for both the purebred and commercial cattlemen. Visitors are welcome all year round to view the facilities and talk to the staff about programs available. During the test season visitors can get statistics on the bulls and heifers on site and look at quality livestock. This year there are 200 bulls on test from ten different breeds (Angus -Black & Red, Blonde, Charolais, Composite, Gelbvieh, Limousin, Maine Anjou, Saler, Simmental and Shorthorn).

This year there are two Blonde bulls on test, both contributed by Forty Acre Blondes. Results from the final weigh day on February 22, 2012 are printed at the bottom of this page. The sale is **April 7th**, **2012** and the floor price on all sale bulls is \$2000. For more information please contact the Manitoba Bull test Station or Forty Acre Blondes directly.

## Blondes = Beef

I have included this article from our 2011 Blonde Bullet for those of your who are new to our mailing list. If you want more detail on the studies referenced in this article please visit the Alberta Blonde Aquitaine Association website, click the News link and then 2011 Bullet. We can also send the info directly to you if that works better.

Now that you have read some of facts regarding Blonde cattle, how do you put this new knowledge to work? Well, the common theme to the traits in which Blondes excel is Beef Production. As we saw from the Residual Feed Intake (RFI) study, Blondes were the most efficient in terms of Feed Conversion and RFI. They used the least amount of feed to produce a pound of beef. That study also showed us that Blondes had the least backfat and largest rib eye area (ie: most muscle), thus they have very high yield and cutability. The meat tenderness study showed us that Blondes have lower collagen levels and more tender meat (lower shear force) than most other breeds. We also saw that Blondes will not marble as well as the other breeds in the studies.

From a commercial perspective (for conventional beef production) the Blonde breed is best positioned as a Terminal sire to be used on British breed cattle. There are a lot of commercial Angus (black or red), Hereford and Baldy herds out there currently being bred back to their own breed or other British breeds. These cattle-

men could benefit immensely from the hybrid vigour provided by the use of a Blonde bull. Basically hybrid vigour allows you to produce more pounds of calf with nearly the same resources. Blondes are also the easiest calving of the major French breeds as they are finer boned, and don't muscle up until about one month of age.

Colour can also be a concern for some cattleman. Blondes range in colour from almost white to tan to dark red. When bred to red or black hided cattle they often produce red or black hided offspring. If you use a lighter coloured Blonde bull you may get tan or smoke coloured calves. Blonde bulls will generally take white off of calves, often just leaving a blaze on Herford or traditionally marked Simmentals.

The resulting calves will also excel in the feedlot with a combination of feed conversion and RFI from the Blondes with the gut capacity and gainability of the British cattle. On the rail the Blondes provide the REA and cutability and lower backfat while the British provide the marbling. On the plate the Blondes have lower shear force (more tender), again combined with the marbling from the British to provide the flavour.

There are also premium markets for lean, healthy beef. High percentage Blonde cattle work very well in this respect as well. Any way you look at it Blondes equal Beef.



#### 2011-2012 West Wind Blondes Bull Test

The West Wind Blondes test began on November 14, 2011 and concluded on March 3, 2012. Eight bulls were put on test this year, with all of them being Fullblood and Polled. 47Y & 227Y are Homozygous polled. All bulls will be vaccinated with Fusoguard for prevention of foot rot, and have Igenity DNA Profiles. Full results including EPD's and Carcass information are available on the West Winds website.

There are also additional bulls that were not part of the official test available for purchase. As with the tested bulls, all weights, EPD's, Igenity profiles and carcass information is available by contacting West Wind Blondes. These bulls are also vaccinated with the Fusoguard.

## **Alberta Breeders at the 2011 National**

After hosting a successful National Show, Sale and AGM in 2010, three Alberta Blonde breeders (and their cattle) made the September trek to Lindsay, Ontario for the 2011 National event. The breeders were Little Creek Farms (Dave Kamelchuk), West Wind Blondes (Myrna Flesch) and Willow Springs Stock Farm (Reed Rigney). The Alberta cattle were well received in Ontario, first at the sale and the next day in the show.

The Annual General Meeting was generally a quiet affair. There weren't any proposed By-law changes so it was mainly an informational gathering. Dave Kamelchuk was returned to the Board of Directors, joining fellow Albertans Myrna Flesch, Ken Mackenzie and Reed Rigney. Myrna was also named the National president following a one year hiatus from the position.

Later that day the seven Alberta bred heifers averaged \$2650 in the National and Ontario Cream of the Crop Sales. Little Creek Farms had the high selling female in the sale selling Little Creek Polled Xander 25X to Paul Fee of Ontario for \$3650. Willow Springs Stock Farm had the third high selling female in the sale, selling WSS Xtravagant 66X for \$3200 to Ryland Cleary of

Quebec. Both heifers were polled Fullbloods. The five other Alberta heifers sold between \$2100 and \$2500.

The Alberta breeders also did their share of bidding at the sale, and came home with three animals, including Crystal Youngblood 28Y, the high

selling animal in the sale at \$5000, purchased by Little Creek Farms and Willow Springs Stock Farm. The young bull carries an impressive set of EPD's placing him in the top 1% of the breed for growth, milk and scrotal circumference. Youngblood was also named the Reserve Champion Bull Calf the next day in the show, while his maternal brother, Crystal Waldo 23W was named 2011 National Champion Bull. Waldo had previously been named the 2010 Reserve National Champion Bull in Alberta.

The Albertans success carried into the show ring the following day. In the Senior Yearling Heifer class the Kamelchuk female Little Creek Xample 146X placed second to the eventual Junior Champion female. Willow Springs Stock Farm placed 1st and 2nd in the Junior Yearling Heifer class with two daughters of the 2010 National Champion Bull, Arsha's Polled Umpire 219U. WSS Xclamation 61X was second while WSS Xtravagant 66X placed first and was also named the Reserve Junior Champion female. This is the second consecutive year that Willow Springs has exhibited the Reserve Junior Female at the Lindsay Show. Xtravagant followed that win by being named Junior Champion Female for new owner Ryland Cleary at the Victoriaville, Quebec show in October.








Bred heifers for sale summer 2012.

#### **Scientists Say Red Meat Is Vital For A Healthy Diet**

When Harvard University published its "Healthy Eating Plate" last September, there was something missing: red meat. Instead of including red meat on their dietary guide, Harvard nutritionists recommended that consumers "choose fish, poultry, beans and nuts." The exclusion of red meat from the Harvard guide contrasts with USDA's MyPlate, which counts lean cuts of beef, ham and other red meats as good protein sources for a healthy diet.

Some nutritionists point out that by excluding red meat from guidelines, Harvard scientists are ignoring significant benefits of red meat in the diet. Studies by groups like the British Nutrition Foundation show that not only is red meat a good source of protein, it is also an important source of nutrients.

In a paper published this month in the journal Meat Science, scientists from Baylor College of Medicine and the USDA-ARS Children's Nutrition Research Council plained that red meat contributes important nutrients to the diet without harming dietary quality. Compared to a group on a diet without beef. consumers of high lean, low-fat beef took in more vitamins

A, C, B, niacin, phosphorus, magnesium, iron, zinc, potassium and protein.

Research also shows that a diet containing <u>lean red</u> <u>meat can actually improve heart function</u>. In this month's issue of the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, researchers from Pennsylvania State University, the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation and Rutgers University published data showing that a diet with lean beef can decrease levels of LDL cholesterol, compared with diets of lean white meat. LDL cholesterol (commonly called "bad cholesterol") can transport fat molecules in the blood stream and contribute to cardiovascular disease.

Red meat is an especially important source of nutrients for infants. During the 2011 joint meeting of the American Society of Animal Science and the Argentine Association of Animal Production, British Nutrition Foundation senior nutritionist Laura Wyness gave a talk titled "Nutritional content and benefits of red meat." Wyness said many infants in the UK show iron deficiency around six months old. She said this can happen when parents don't get their babies enough meat during weaning. During weaning, parents will replace milk with fruit and vegetable puree, and this limited diet leads to a lack of iron and zinc.

"It's important to start to wean on to meat," Wyness said.

Not only is meat a good source of iron, but the type of iron in meat is more easily absorbed by the body than iron found in foods like spinach. A 1988 University of Washington study showed that the human

body can absorb 15-35% of iron found in "heme meat (called iron") but only 2-20% of other types of iron. In their paper, titled "Iron nutrition and absorption: dietary factors which impact iron bioavailability," the researchers said adding meat to a diet could help individuals vulnerable to iron loss — such as pregnant women and menstruating women



Wyness said red meat is also an important source of vitamin D. Though many people can get all the vitamin D they need from the sun, absorption is trickier for groups like the elderly and those with darker skin.

"That makes meat an important source," Wyness said

Lean red meat, like the kind tested in the *Meat Science* study, is easy to find.

"Many popular cuts that you're familiar with are lean" says Shalene McNeill, executive director of nutrition research for the National Cattleman's Beef Association.

#### Healthy Beef continued .....

McNeill says consumers should look for beef products with "round" or "loin" in the name. Sirloin, tenderloin and flank steaks all fit the bill as lean red meats.

McNeill believes Harvard's guidelines on limiting red meat may come from a misperception that Americans eat too much meat already. She cited a Baylor University study which showed that Americans only eat, on average, 1.7 oz. of beef/day/person. For reference, 1.7 oz. is about weight of a medium-sized chicken egg.

"For calorie investment, that's making a huge nutrient contribution," McNeill says.

Adria Sheil-Brown, a National Pork Board dietician, adds that proteins found in red meat can actually help people lose weight, a claim confirmed by years of nutrition research. In a 2004 paper titled "High-Protein, Low-Fat Diets Are Effective for Weight Loss and Favorably Alter Biomarkers in Healthy Adults," a team of Arizona State University scientists wrote that high-protein diets are also more satisfying. This means dieters are more likely to stick to high-protein diets and continue to lose weight.

Like McNeill, Sheil-Brown believes there are misconceptions about the value of red meat. She said many people don't realize that red meat can contain many nutrients but few calories. For example, a 3 oz. cut of pork tenderloin has under three grams of fats and around 120 calories.

"Pork tenderloin is just as lean as a skinless chicken breast," Sheil-Brown says. "The problem is just keeping your portion size in check – and that's true with any food."
